Flowers

Anemones, 3 sprays
Aster, any type, 3 blooms
Bachelor buttons, 3 sprays
Begonias tuberous, 1 bloom (foliage and other buds not necessary)
Calendula, 3 blooms
Carnations, 3 sprays
Celosia, 3 blooms
Chrysanthemums, 1 spray or disbudded stem
Clarkia, 3 sprays
Coreopsis, 3 sprays
Cosmos, 3 sprays
Dahlias (large) one bloom, (small) 3 blooms
Daisies, 3 blooms (Daisies michaelmas, 1 spray)
Dianthus, 5 blooms
Everlastings, 3 blooms or sprays (strawflowers, gomphera, etc)
Geraniums, 1 branch
Gladiolus, 1 stalk*
Glargia, 3 blooms
Hostas (foliage), 3 leaves
Impatiens, 3 sprays
Larkspur, 3 sprays
Lavatera, 3 sprays
Lilies, 1 stalk
Marguerites, 3 sprays
Marigold, 3 blooms (French Marigold, 5 blooms)
Montbretias or corocosmia, 3 sprays
Nasturtiums, 5 blooms
Pansies & Violas, 5 blooms
Petunias, 3 sprays
Phlox, 3 sprays or stems
Roses, 1 spray (Hybrid tea, 1 bloom without side buds – Miniatures, 3 blooms)

Rudbeckia, 3 blooms
Stock, 3 spikes
Snapdragons, 3 spikes
Stalice, 3 sprays
Sunflowers (over 6 inches), one bloom
(under 6 inches), 3 blooms
Sweet peas, 5 stems
Yarrow (Achellia), 3 stems
Zinnias, 3 blooms (miniature types 5 blooms)

Fruit

Apples, 5 (with stems on)
Cherries, a pint berry basket full
Grapes (3 bunches)
Pears, 5 (with stems on)
Peaches, 5
Quince, 5
Plums, 12

Berries & Nuts

A pint berry basket full of berries
A dozen nuts

Vegetables

Artichokes, 3
Beans, 12 (shelled beans – 1 pint)
Beets baby, 6 – table; 3 (table beets are 1 ½ - 3 inches in diameter)
Broccoli, head
Brussel Sprouts, 6
Cabbage, one head
Carrots, 6 – table or baby; larger 3
Cauliflower, one head
Celery, one stalk
Corn, 3 ears (husked)
Cucumbers pickling 1 to 2 ½ inches long 12; pickling 2 ½ to 5 inches long; slicing 6 inches and over, 3
Garlic, 1 head
Kohlrabi, 3

Leek, 3

Lettuce, 1 head; Leaf Lettuce plant in container of water (or dirt)
Onions green & multiplier, 6 – all others 3
Parsnips, 6
Peas, 10 pods
Peppers, 3
Potatoes, 3
Pumpkins, 1
Rhubarb, 3 stalks
Spinach, as leaf lettuce
Squash, 1
Swiss Chard, potted as plant
Tomatoes, 3; cherry or vine display 1 cascade
Turnips, 3

Herbs

Herbs maybe potted or as a single spray



*A good gladiolus specimen has approximately 1/3 of the florets open, 1/3 showing color and 1/3 in bud. Two of the bottom florets may be removed but leave the sheath. Florets and buds make up 40% of the entire stem.
